She has also previously served at the U.S. Embassies in Namibia and Saudi Arabia. Before becoming a diplomat, Ms. Wang worked as a consultant in the consumer products industry. She received a master's degree in international relations from the George Washington University and an undergraduate degree in business administration and marketing from the State University of New York at Albany. She is joined in Japan by her husband. She speaks Japanese and Mandarin. Her interests include working out, reading, and traveling.
